UKRAINIANS TO HOLD PARADE AND PRESENT DRAMA ON SUNDAY

PATRIOTIC DEMONSTRATION WILL FOLLOW VESPER SERVICE IN RUTHENIAN CHURCH

The residents of Ukrainian birth in this city and its environs have completed plans for a great parade and celebration on Sunday which will be followed by a dramatic performance in the Russian National Hall, Fourth and Hudson Streets, in the evening. The proceeds will go toward war relief work. There will be speakers on W. S. S. and the campaign of the Ukrainians in the W. S. S. drive will be given a big boost.

All the Ukrainian societies will gather at St. Nicholas' Ruthenian Greek Catholic Church, in Van Buren Street, near Hope Avenue, at 4 p. m. to attend vesper services to be conducted by the rector of the church, the Rev. B. Merenko. The services will be followed by a parade, in which all the societies and the school children will march, carrying standards, headed by the Ukrainian Band.

It is expected that the paraders will reach the Hall at Hudson and Fourth Streets about 7 o'clock, when W. S. S. addresses will be given. Then will follow a drama, which will be given in the national costumes of the Ukrainians.

The play is "The Obscure World," in four acts. It is a romance of the Ukraine, based on the fight for emancipation from obscurity and for political and intellectual intelligence. It opens with a scene before the village hall, where the young people gather for the Easter Festival. They have organized a society for the purpose of gaining knowledge. As they are about to enter the hall the intoxicated sheriff appears and forbids the meeting and orders the hall closed and the crowd dispersed. Nicholas, the leader of the young people, attempts to interfere with the sheriff, who is then appealed to by Mary, a fair maiden with whom the sheriff's son is in love. Then a series of events follow and a decidedly interesting story unfolds. It is interspersed with music. Other numbers are also on the program, including addresses in the Ukrainian tongue.

RECORD SHARPLY CRITICISES STAND OF THE GOVERNOR

CALLS HIS RATE STAND NONSENSE IN DOMAIN OF REASON AND WORSE IN LAW

(Special to The Daily News.) Rahway, June 27.—Governor Edge's refusal to convene the Legislature in special session, as suggested by George L. Record, was sharply criticized last night by Record, when he addressed a meeting in his tent in Rahway, in connection with his campaign for the Republican United States Senatorial nomination.

Record, who is associate counsel for the New Jersey municipalities in the fight against the proposed increase in the trolley fare rates, had demanded a special session in order that the threatened rate raise might be averted by appropriate legislation.

A decision on the rate matter by the Public Utility Commission is liable to be handed down now any day. Record in his speech said:

"Governor Edge in his reply to my letter asking him to call a special session of the Legislature to amend the Public Utility Act so as to hold the public utility corporations to their agreement with the municipalities to charge not more than five-cent trolley fares, rests his refusal upon two main assumptions. The first is that by the decision of the Court of Errors and Appeals last week the State now is vested with the power to repeal these
